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# Mickelson wins!



After capturing his first green jacket at the 1990 Porter Cup, Phil Mickelson would add two more to his closet by winning the Masters in 2004 and 2006

Arizona State University junior Phil Mickelson thought he had lost the Porter Cup after a third-round 75 left him six strokes behind leader David Duval, a sophomore from Georgia Tech.

But the two-time NCAA Champion knew he could still win the 32<sup>nd</sup> annual classic, and combined with a dramatic 25-foot birdie putt on the 17<sup>th</sup> hole, shot a spectacular 7-under par 63 to take the championship from Duval by one stroke.

The Champion said it was, "the best round of my life. I put my heart into every shot. When the putt went in on 17, I couldn't believe it. It gave me chills."

"I played well," said Duval of his final round 70, which included a double bogey at the par-3, fourth hole. "I didn't lose. Phil took it from me."
